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Message from the Company

To Unitholders

Market Summary

The global economy in the second half of 2025 continued to navigate a landscape shaped by geopolitical tensions, evolving trade dynamics, and diverging monetary policies. Growth momentum softened but avoided a sharp downturn, with global GDP expected to decelerate as tariff-related distortions and policy uncertainty weighed on major economies. Global equity markets reflected this mix of resilience and caution. International markets outpaced U.S. equities as investors rotated toward regions with more attractive valuations and improving macro conditions. Yet volatility persisted due to renewed tariff announcements, geopolitical escalation, and lingering uncertainty around corporate earnings. Despite these headwinds, risk appetite remained supported by expectations of policy easing, particularly in Europe and parts of Asia, and by continued strength in AI-related investment themes. Overall, global markets entered year-end with cautious optimism, balancing macro risks against improving financial conditions and recovering sentiment.

China's equity markets showed signs of renewed strength in 2025, recovering meaningfully after years of volatility as investors responded to attractive valuations, improved liquidity, and structural shifts toward advanced manufacturing and innovation-driven sectors. Breakthroughs in AI, biotechnology, electric vehicles, and battery technology positioned China as a major competitor in high-end global supply chains, reinforcing investor confidence through the year. Market stabilization measures-including policy support and capital injections during periods of stress-helped lift sentiment and encouraged broader participation across both A-shares and offshore markets. By late 2025, Chinese equities were benefiting from expectations of a global rate-cut cycle, which historically redirects capital flows toward emerging markets. While macro uncertainties remained, especially around domestic demand softness and property-sector weakness, the equity outlook for H2 leaned positive as structural themes-in industrial upgrading, technology innovation, and state-backed strategic sectors-continued to anchor medium-term growth potential. Although India's equity market came under pressure in the second half of 2025 due to higher-than-expected U.S. import tariffs, foreign investor selling, and downward revisions to corporate earnings forecasts, the Nifty 50 declined early in the period and underperformed other major regional markets. Mid-and small-cap stocks weakened even more sharply. Nevertheless, domestic institutional investors continued to provide strong buying support, and consumer-oriented sectors-such as automobiles and household appliances-benefited from GST reforms and government measures aimed at boosting household purchasing power. While short-term volatility may persist, India's solid economic fundamentals, supportive monetary and fiscal policies, and structural growth drivers continue to underpin a positive medium-term outlook for the country's equity market.


Fund's Investment Strategy

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Unitholders of UOB Smart China India Fund

Opinion

I have audited the financial statements of UOB Smart China India Fund ("the Fund"), which comprise the statement of financial position and details of investments as at 30 November 2025, and the statement of comprehensive income and statement of changes in net assets for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of UOB Smart China India Fund as at 30 November 2025, and its financial performance and changes in its net assets for the year then ended in accordance with the Accounting Guidance for Mutual Funds and Provident Funds issued by the Association of Investment Management Companies and approved by the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Basis for Opinion

I conducted my audit in accordance with Thai Standards on Auditing. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I am independent of the Fund in accordance with the Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants, including Independence Standards issued by the Federation of Accounting Professions (Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants) that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises information including in annual report but does not include the financial statements and my auditor's report thereon, which is expected to be made available to me after that date.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and I do not and will not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with my audit of the financial statements, my responsibility is to read the other information identified above and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or my knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to materially misstated.

When I read the annual report, if I conclude that there is a material misstatement therein, I am required to communicate the matter to management to make correction the misstatement.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the Accounting Guidance for Mutual Funds and Provident Funds issued by the Association of Investment Management Companies and approved by the Securities and Exchange Commission, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Fund or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Thai Standards on Auditing will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Thai Standards on Auditing, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Fund's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.

- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Fund to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 NOVEMBER 2025

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

UOB Smart China India Fund (“the Fund”) was registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (“SEC”) on 8 December 2010 with the registered value of Baht 1,400 million (divided into 140 million investment units at Baht 10 each). UOB Asset Management (Thailand) Company Limited (“the Management Company”) serves as the Fund’s Manager and Investment Unit Registrar and KASIKORNBANK PUBLIC COMPANY LIMITED serves as the Fund’s Trustee.

The Fund is an open-ended fund with no stipulated project life, which divides the investment units into 2 classes as follows:

1. Not to pay dividends class.
2. To pay dividends class.

The Fund’s policy is to invest in a foreign unit trust of the United China-India Dynamic Growth Fund Class T SGD Acc which is registered in Singapore and is managed by UOB Asset Management Ltd. at the average rate not less than 80% of its net asset value.

The Fund’s policy is to pay dividends to unitholders type of to pay dividends class with the procedures as specified in the prospectus.

The Fund’s policy is not to pay dividends to the unitholders type of not to pay dividends class.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements of the Fund are prepared in accordance with the Accounting Guidance for Mutual Funds and Provident Funds issued by the Association of Investment Management Companies and approved by the SEC (“Accounting Guidance”), while for those matters not covered by the Accounting Guidance, the Fund applies Thai Financial Reporting Standards issued by the Federation of Accounting Professions.

The financial statements in Thai language are the official statutory financial statements of the Fund. The financial statements in English language have been translated from the Thai language financial statements.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Investments

Investments are recognised as assets at fair value at the date on which the Fund has the right on investments.

- Investments in foreign unit trusts are presented at fair value by using the latest value of net assets per unit on the date of investment measurement.

Net unrealised gains or losses arising from their revaluation of investments to be fair value are reflected in profit or loss.

The weighted average method is used to determine the cost of each security at the time of sales.

Distributions

The Fund records decrease of retained earnings on the notifying date of dividend payment declaration.

Revenues and Expenses Recognition

Interest income is recognised as interest accrues, based on the effective interest rate method.

Other income and expenses are recognised on an accrual basis.

On disposal of an investment, the difference between net consideration received and carrying amount is recognised in profit or loss.

Accounts in Foreign Currencies

Accounts in foreign currencies are converted into Baht at the rates of exchange on the transaction date. Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies at the end of the year are converted into Baht at the rates of exchange on that date.

Foreign exchange differences are recognised in profit or loss.

Income Tax

The Fund shall pay income tax according to the Revenue Code based on income under section 40 (4) (a) at the rate of 15% of income before deducting expenses.

Use of Accounting Judgments and Estimates

Preparation of financial statements in conformity with Accounting Guidance requires management to make judgments and estimates that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenues, expenses and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

The judgments and estimates are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised prospectively.

Fair Value Estimation

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between buyers and sellers (market participants) at the measurement date. The Fund used quoted prices in active markets in measuring assets and liabilities which required to be measured at fair value under related accounting guidance. In case that there is no active market for identical assets or liabilities or the quoted prices in active markets are not available, the Fund will estimate the fair value using valuation techniques that fit to each circumstance and try to use observable data that is relevant to the assets or liabilities to be measured as much as possible.

The following table shows fair value of financial instruments categorised by measurement approach with different levels in a fair value hierarchy as follows:

- Level 1: quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
